
What is dementia?



Alzheimer Society

Alzheimer's disease and other dementias

- There are many types of dementia.
- Dementia is not part of normal aging.
- Dementia is progressive –
 it is experienced
 in stages.



Stigma Survey

- 46 per cent would feel ashamed or embarrassed if they had dementia.
- 61 per cent felt they would face discrimination of some kind.
- 59 per cent feel they would not be confident to help a person with dementia who appeared to need assistance.

Who can refer clients to First Link®?



First Link® benefits

- Initial contact an average of 11 months earlier than
 if families reached out on their own, with ongoing follow
 up.
- Support and learning opportunities that build confidence and skills to maintain quality of life as much as possible.
- Connection to a supportive community of others living with dementia.








Support and education on the dementia journey



How can you refer someone to First Link®?



The referral form can be uploaded to Electronic Medical Records system or faxed, and includes:

- Confirmation of permission
- Your information (for faxed receipt of contact)
- Client information
- Primary contact


What will your client receive after you refer?

- An initial outreach call explaining First Link® and what it offers to them.
- The First Link® bulletin, highlighting regional support and learning opportunities on a quarterly basis.
- Ongoing support calls and information about specific services and resources appropriate to their needs.
